




Class JK

Communication has been a real focus for teaching and programming at Fisher Road School over the last couple of years, especially the concept of "Total Communication",



which is where stu-

dents may use a variety of communication modalities. such as speech, (Pictorial Exchange Communication System), KWS (Key Word Signing) and electronic augmentative communication devices and apps (Prologuo2go on an iPad), rather than being restricted to a single modality. This focus on communication in all KLAs, but especially in English, has led to students being able to communicate their basic wants and needs and emotional states more effectively across the school. Here we can see Kane using the augmentative communication app Prologuo2go on an iPad to make choices about his morning tea. Kane is very adept at using this program to express his basic wants and needs and it has helped to diminish his frustration at not being able to express



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what he wants using speech or gesture. Well done, Kane!

Staff Development Day-Variation

As you are aware the Term 2 Staff Development Day was varied. This meant that there was not a staff development day in Term 2 with students returning to school on the Monday 26th April. As you are already aware, the varied staff development day for Fisher Road School is being held on Friday August 26th which means the school will not be operational for students on this day. Thank you for your agreement in varying this day which has allowed for our school to work alongside two other SSP schools being Clarke Road and Sir Eric Woodward School. The project we are involved in has established a powerful community of practice among the three schools that all face the significant challenge of enhancing the lives and learning of students with disabilities in the north Sydney area. The focus of the professional learning for staff on this day will be on building teacher capacity to deliver quality learning outcomes for our students. Our goal is to establish a collegiate that will innovate and share exceptional practice and support the growth in capability and effectiveness of all our teachers through strengthening Performance and development systems and practices. I look forward to sharing further updates on this dynamic initiative with you later in the year.

Professional Learning @ Fisher Road School

The Term 3 Staff Development Day held on Monday 18th July was an opportunity for teachers to attend the Special Education Principal and Leaders Association (SEPLA) Conference. The SLSO staff also attended professional learning at school including sessions on Proloquo2go and Boardmaker before completing E-emergency care, Anaphylaxis and Administration of medication.





The following is a snapshot of the day from Assistant Principal Arianne McCombie. The morning started with an informative and inspiring talk on what leadership looks like today and evaluative thinking. The essence being that school teams need to focus on what you need to stop doing in order to have a greater impact on student learning. We need to have a deep and narrow focus rather than spreading our resources too thinly on many projects and doing none of them effectively. This related very well to the talk on teacher resilience. The breakout sessions after lunch were the most practical. We were stepped through the journey of one school in Newcastle and their experience with the NDIS which helped us understand the impact from a schools point of view. The second session was fabulous. It was delivered by staff members from Passfield Park School and introduced their Every School Every Student (ESES) project which was to develop a communication toolbox. Fisher Road staff are keen to unpack these resources and see what capabilities they have with the learning program for students at our school.

Philip Riley from the Australian Catholic University delivered an excellent talk on resilience in executive and the importance of addressing excessive stress and preventing burnout due to unrealistic workloads. Matt went to an informative talk about sport across the school and how to embed it into class timetables. Developing a scope and sequence for the year and having each term focusing on a particular sport or skill.

The highlight of the day was the end keynote speaker - Deng Thiak Adut. He is a defence lawyer, community leader and refugee advocate. His talk was inspirational and took us through his journey from child soldier in Sudan to now in Australia. A truly remarkable example of strength, persistence and passion.
