

Staff Development Day— Variation

Again, thank you for your support in varying our Term 2 staff development day. On Friday 26th August all teaching staff attended a join conference with teachers from Clarke Road School and Sir Eric Woodward School. This

opportunity has not been available before. The day provided teachers with a chance to work with Rob Stones who is the designer and author of more than 30 distinctive leadership workshops and intervention programs. This day focused on connecting new ideas and extending our professional knowledge and skills. We also collaborated with other teachers and made a commitment to continue networking between the schools as we move forward.

Our SLSOs spent half the day off-site visiting other schools or services to gain insight in various approaches, strategies and interventions for students with additional learning needs. The remainder of the day included individual learning sessions to broaden knowledge and skills in the use of technology as a device to assist learning.

This involves collaborated discussion on current progress with identification of the 3 priority Personalised Learning Plan (PLP) goals. These priority goals are the focus for school and home for the remainder of 2016, this supports our students to achieve their personal best. 
