## Out Of The Blue Art Exhibition

The student exhibition ran from 6<sup>th</sup> - 17<sup>th</sup> September, and was a collaboration between SSP schools: The Beach school, Fisher Road. Arranounbai, Stewart House and Narremburn school. The exhibition was a wonderful opportunity for students to be inspired by the theme, Out of the Blue, and create art works using a range of mediums such as ceramics, photog-







raphy, painting and sculpture. Fisher Road students worked together to create an amazing ocean installation featuring jelly fish made from recycled plastic bags, a deconstructed surf board and a curtain of blue bottle tops that were collected, and threaded in work skills programs.

The exhibition opening on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> September was a chance for the community to view the amazing work, some of which were for sale, and celebrate the student achievements. The Fisher Road School signing choir were a spectacular feature to open the exhibition and the audience were impressed.

The student picnic on the 15<sup>th</sup> September was a chance for students from the five schools to meet together at the art space, view the exhibition and have lunch together in the surrounding park. ## Enhancing an innovative and dynamic school

Fisher Road School Plan 2015-2017 Strategic Direction 2

Thank you to all our families who returned the communication survey already there have been some helpful suggestions and feedback that highlight the enablers and barriers to communicating between home and school. Results indicate:

- The top 5 most important aspects of the communication between school and home in the communication book are:
- 1. general disposition e.g. I had a happy day

- Medical needs i.e. first aid/seizure
- 3. Activities completed e.g. I went bowling
- 4. New behaviours observed
- 5. Your child's progress (PLP/program)
- 82% (23) respondents advised they would find communication between home and school better if, in addition to the communication book a photograph was sent home each day

There were also many suggestions for different communication platforms. Currently we have 1 class who have been trailing the SeeSaw app with positive feedback and next term we will be expanding this trial to include 2 other classes as we explore various other communication systems. As of next term, every student will have their class timetable stuck into the front of their communication book so that you can refer to the activities they did during the day using the communication system you have developed for use at home. Some parents have requested the class teacher upload some images into Proloquo2go on their child's iPad which has worked successfully whilst other parents continue to send in remnants or photos to aid communication for their child.

Reporting any illnesses or injuries In reviewing our communication, the school have relooked at our communication to parents when their child is sick, the First Aid Officer is called or there is an injury. Parents/carers will be informed of any minor illness or injury via the students communication book on the day with (where possible) a phone call made to parents prior to the student going home.

Thank you for what has been another busy term of teaching and learning. I hope our entire school community have an enjoyable holiday break and return safe, healthy and happy for the final term of the year.






### Class NS

Class CW are learning to use a PECS schedule strip for each school day of the week. Visual schedules help students to have a smooth transition between activities and routines.





# Title: Out of the Ocean Blue Medium: Installation of Recycled Material

Students at Fisher Road School and the school community were involved in the process of this collaborative installation piece. From the collection of recycled materials by parents and the local community, to students preparing holes in the plastic bottle tops, threading and sorting during work skills and fine motor skills programs.

The concept of working together became an important learning outcome for all students in this whole school approach to art making across the junior and senior school.

The result was a collection of curtain like, threaded bottle tops that were hung in the gallery along with jelly fish made from recycled plastic bags and a deconstructed surf board.


