
Class SB

Class TA




Every Thursday, class TA go on an excursion to Stony Range Regional Botanic Garden for a sensory walk and lunch. This excursion provides our students an oppor-

TACPAC



Tacpac is a sensory communication resource using touch and

music to help communication and social skills. There is a compatible link between the sensory world of touch and the sensory world of music. Tacpac focuses on aligning these sensory forces, combining the sense of touch and music through social interaction. It is delivered via an interaction between 2 people – a giver and a receiver. The session is structured and takes place in an emotionally safe environment, clear of other sensory interferences. Tacpac is hugely beneficial for people who have sensory processing difficulties. This can mean anyone of any age or stage of ability. At the moment Tacpac is being used with a couple of students from the junior section each week. However, once staff are trained up, we hope to run a whole class Tacpac session for some classes.

SEAT - A Royal North Shore Hospital School Community Project



Royal North Shore Hospital School enters an exciting third year for the SEAT Project. This is an immersive hands-on project where students construct and create artworks on small bamboo seats - the design celebrates diversity and self-expression of all those involved. Students on the ward, our local schools, parents, art specialists, youth workers and community members are united in a common goal. The process and the story behind each creation are equally as important as the ripple effect auction.

The S.E.A.T Project which stands for 'Sustainability, Education, Art and Teamwork' teaches social initiatives and supports student wellbeing. These elements combined, provide foundations for strong community connections and highlight how individuals, as a collective, can make positive changes in the world. Community involvement creates a sense of belonging and purpose and increases self-esteem and resilience, particularly within our students.

In August the SEATs are showcased and auctioned to raise money for local and international charities. All proceeds will go to Northern Beaches Women's Shelter and Seven Women Charity in Nepal. STEM

Our new virtual reality headset has arrived and to say we are excited is an understatement. It is called the Oculus Quest and is a top of the line piece of technology that has only just been released on the market. We have been learning about wearing it safely, staying inside the safe zone while using it, staying away from the person who is having a turn and also how to hold and use the controllers. Some of the games we have been using are tennis, bowling, baseball, angry birds, fruit ninja and also exploring environments such as the savanna desert or the ocean. One of the underwater experiences places you in a shark cage and you can see the great white sharks swimming around you. The possibilities are endless. I have been most impressed but the students listening skills while they have been learning to use the controllers. These concepts are difficult to grasp and the students have shown excellent concentration and determination while learning. We are looking forward to building our skills so we can explore more of what the Oculus has to offer.



Students have been experimenting with a range of new inclusive art resources that allow all students to participate in pattern and mark making with paint. The finger stamper slides onto a students index finger and patterns can be made by moving a

finger up and down. George A., Rafaella, Kanga and Kyle all enjoyed using this art tool to make designs for cards. The textured stampers have been very popular with students. Some have an easy to grip handle that allows students to practice stamping and lifting to make overlapping designs. Another stamper features a thick handle like a paint brush which makes artwork accessible for students who are practising fine motor skills. A series of patterned rollers have also been fun to roll across the paint and onto paper. Sekayi, Daniel and Riley have enjoyed this the most. A new Communication Board in art has been added to include actions in art such as roll, stamp, dot, smear, brush and splatter.

Learning Art along with Aboriginal Cultural perspectives, students experimented with using native plants to apply paint to paper. James S., Jude and Billy was particularly intrigued to use a Bottle brush flower to make interesting patterns on paper. Tiago explored small branches and native pods to stamp patterns onto paper. Everyone had fun learning about alternative ways to apply paint













artworks.

It was a great (すばらしい) week!



Aboriginal Education

Recently, Caroline Glass-Pattison, our cultural mentor, visited Fisher Road school and worked together with the Aboriginal Education team. Together we came up with a plan for a Flag Raising Ceremony in August to coincide with NAIDOC week and National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children's Day. Aunty Caroline guided the team to embed Aboriginal cultural perspectives into student learning activities such as planting a garden at the front of the school with lovely native plants, designing and painting a meeting pole, and creating a 'Yarning Circle' out of sandstone rocks, where students can sit together and listen to sensory stories. Also, the team plan to create a Welcome wall, with a variety of languages, to show the diversity of students at Fisher Road School.



Students have already started to paint a light blue base coat on the meeting pole in preparation for the design. These activities are some of the ways that students are learning about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and histories.

On May 27th, during Reconciliation Week, Clarence Bruinsma, The NSW Department of Education, Aboriginal Education and Wellbeing Advisor led a Professional Learning session at Fisher Road School. Clarence covered the significance of an Acknowledgment of Country to inform all people about Aboriginal culture and history. In groups, staff wrote their own Acknowledgement of country and then synthesised the best points into a personalised Acknowledgement of Country for Fisher Road School. This Acknowledgement can be used at the opening of meetings and events.

USING COMMUNICATION TEMPTATIONS TO MOTIVATE COMMUNICATION

Many children with ASD do not feel the need or motivated to communicate as everyone in their environment thinks for them, gives them what they want or even anticipates their needs. When you create a communication programme it is VITAL you create as many opportunities as possible for the child to communicate.

The key to promote communication is to immerse the child in a communication enriched environment. The easiest way to do this is to look around the environment at home and school, and think of all the times in the day when you could model, promote, encourage or support communication. Creating as many visuals, schedules, activities and routines as possible are a great way to promote communication.


Start with activities that are particularly desirable or intriguing for your child are more likely to 'tempt' them or provide them with sufficient motivation to communicate with another person. Encourage verbal children to use their words or extend their word i.e. "Drink" to "I want drink" and non-verbal children to use visuals/signs/gesture to communicate.

10 KEY RULES TO A SUCCESSFUL COMMUNICATION PROGRAMME

- Ensure consistency between environments.
- 2 Be eclectic; try lots of different ideas and strategies.
- 3 Remember not every strategy works for everyone.
- 4 Never assume incompetence.
- 5 Always model good communication practices.
- Make communication functional.
- 7 Make communication fun and enjoyable.
- 8 Use rewards and motivators.
- 9 Ensure the child has communication enriched environments.
- 10 Be persistent and REPEAT, REPEAT, REPEAT.

Every strategy, no matter how bizarre, is worth a try and if at first you don't succeed then try and try again. No one child with ASD is the same so not all strategies will work with every child – so think carefully of how to adapt a strategy to suit the particular individual.
